Pietro P. Federico of Fort Pond Boulevard, Springs, a restaurant owner, died April 15 at the Southampton, Hospital after a long illness. He was 55, and had been a resident of the town for 34 years.

Mr. Federico was born Nov. 16, 1908, in East Quogue, the son of Charles and Louise Federico. He married the former Nina M. Hulse, who survives. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Concetta Raynor, of Miami, Fla., and a brother, Ross Federico, of Quogue.

Mr. Federico was a member of the Elks; and of the Episcopal Church. Funeral services were held April 18, at the Yardley and William Funeral Home, the Rev. Samuel Davis officiating. Elks services had been held the previous evening. Burial was in Green River Cemetery, Springs, - 4/23/64

Mysterious Fire Totally Destroys Jungle Pete's

Fire of undetermined origin razed one of East Hampton's well known taverns Saturday morning, when Pete's Restaurant burned to the ground at an estimated loss of \$20,-000 to its owners, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Federico.

Familiarly known as "Jungle Pete's," the club was located on Fort Pond Boulevard, a few hundred yards from the Three Mile Harbor road. It derived its name from the first restaurant opened there several years ago by its owners. that time the land had not been cleared and the restaurant was surrounded by a "jungle" of scrub oaks and underbrush.

Mr. Federico said he was awakened at 8 o'clock Saturday morning by the sound of crackling flames and breaking glass, and from his cottage next to the inn saw that the entire dance hall wing was in flames. He forced open the rear door of the building and his dog, a Chesapeake Bay Retriever, crawled out unharmed from the smoke and flames.

The East Hampton fire department responded to an alarm, but the fire was already beyond control before it could reach there. Hoses were held ready to keep the fire from spreading to the nearby cottages. Within an hour flames had leveled the building, and the intense heat caused several hundred bottles to explode.

Over one thousand dollars worth of whiskey and other beverages was lost in the fire. Bottles could be heard exploding in the ruins as late as midnight Saturday. Souvenir hunters found several pieces of silver melted from coins by the in-tense heat. Equipment loss included two stoves, two refrigerators, a washing machine and piano. While no immediate plans have been made for rebuilding, Mr. Federico stated that he hoped soon to have a new "jungle" on the same site.
