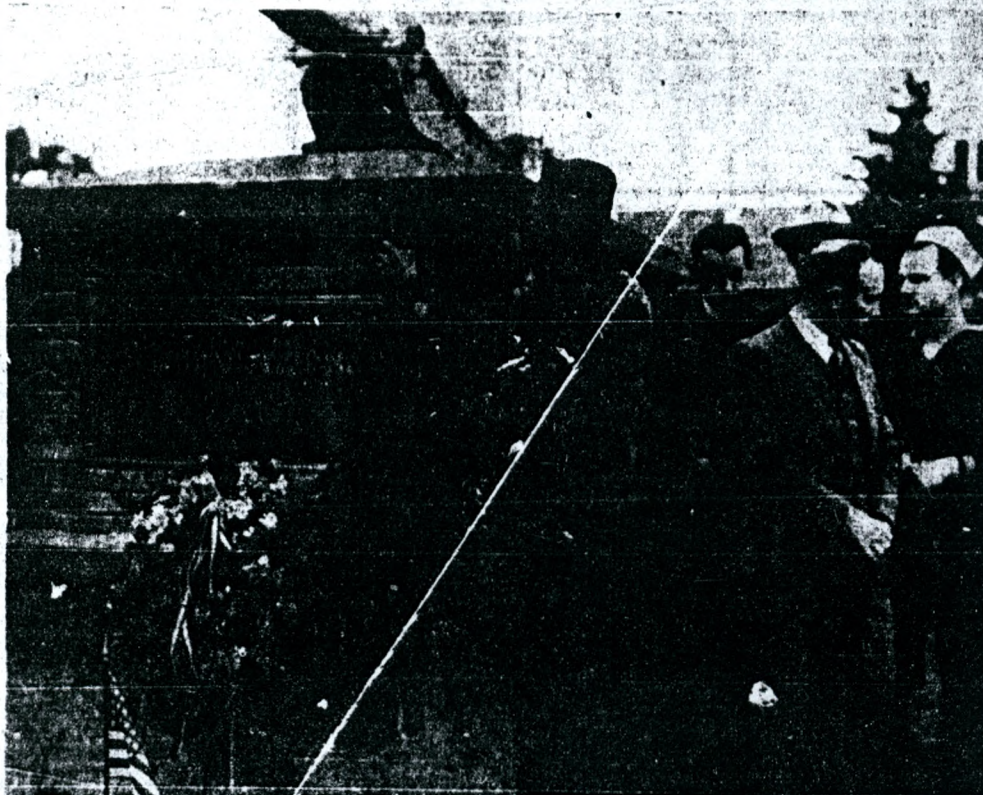

## B. Ingalls, Man And Or, 76, Dies

Ingalls, 76 years old, gunsmith repair man, died on Floyd Street on Tuesday after an illness of four weeks. He was born in Cambrichton, on March 3, 1871. Dr. and Nellie Horton had lived in East Hampton for many years. He had his own home for more than 40 years. The Spanish-American War was in poor health; his Vermont doctor advised him to try a change of climate, so he came here to live with George Ingalls. He died at once, and liked East Hampton so much that he decided to stay. He did repair work for many years in Roy Edwards' shop, the "Strong Brothers". He was a gunsmith, a watchmaker, and worked at it off and on. He was 14. His versatile work was the result of many experiences as wheelwright, laborer on a railroad, engineer in a sawmill, a power plant, a bicycle shop, the watchmaker, he combined with his number of the city police land, Vermont. He liked to invent, and invented a watch ring and a machine in his home is a clock of parts. He built a metal ring from parts of an old movie machine, washing a buffing head from a watchcase factory, \$2.50. ## Montauk Boy, 3, Drowns in Pond While Playing

A tragic accident occurred yesterday at Montauk when little Bradley Edwards Tuthill, three years old, was drowned in Fort Pond. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis M. Tuthill of Montauk; his mother is the former Frances Scott of East Hampton. The Tuthills have two older children, Craig and Peggy Ann.

Bradley was playing near his home as usual, with Carol Ann Belber, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Belber; Carol is a few months younger than he. They were inseparable, and often played on the school grounds nearby. They must have wandered to a little dock near the old Payne home on Fort Pond, a place where they had never played before. No one saw Bradley fall in, but his playmate, and she must have tried to pull him out, for she was wet far above her waist. She ran to the Brockman house crying, seeking her brother Dickie on the way and Bradley's brother Craig. Older people ran toward the pond, but Craig had already reached it and pulled his brother's body out. General Norman T. Kirk, former Surgeon General of the U. S. Army now on Montauk, happened to be in East Hampton and returned to Montauk shortly after Dr. David Edwards arrived. After working over the little boy for two hours, hope of saving his life was given up.

Bradley was born Oct. 1, 1943. Funeral services will be held at the Yardley Funeral Home on Saturday at 2:30 o'clock.
